### Press Notes

What inspired this film ?

#### Véronique

The idea of Woman to Woman grew out of discussions with mothers of teenagers about issues relating to being a woman or becoming one. Producing Woman to Woman is exciting because it touches two areas that matter most in my life, being a mother and making films.

#### Malika

I joined the film after my mother had already begun because I felt it was important to have a teenager's perspective. The film's intention is for mothers and daughters to better understand each other and to have open conversations. This could not be done if the conversation was told only through a mother's eyes.

#### What do you want the audience to take away?

Véronique

Mistakes are made. Lessons are learnt. As our daughters grow up so do we.

Malika

Teenagers want to live their own lives, but a little guidance never hurt anyone.

What surprised you as you were working on this film ?

Véronique

I was surprised to see how many of us harbor fear and how this shapes our relationship with our daughters.

Malika

Although we are all unique, almost every teenager wants the same thing.

Press Notes (continued)

What was the hardest part of working on this film ?

Véronique

There were several challenges

Working around everyone's schedule

Finding the right location. I favored rooftops and gardens for esthetics but also for audio concerns.

Keeping the conversation between mothers and daughters coherent without interrupting its flow.

Malika

The hardest part was accepting that people weren't going to say exactly what I wanted, but that they had their own answers and would say as little or as much as they felt.

Press Notes (continued)

How different is this film from other films about mothers-daughters ?

Véronique

This film has a unique structure. Each teenager was interviewed by Malika while I interviewed the mothers. These interviews were then woven into a single conversation.

Malika

By having the mothers be interviewed by a mother and the teenagers be interviewed by a teen, everyone felt comfortable enough to open up. It is an open conversation as the mothers and daughters find out more about each other.

Press Notes (continued)

Final Notes:

The teenagers who appear in the movie range from fourteen to nineteen. Some are related to the mothers in the movie and some are not. The mothers are all mothers of a teenage girl at the time of the interview. Some mothers also have teenage boys.

Khadijah, my youngest daughter who was fourteen at the time of the filming, appears in the documentary. She was interviewed by her sister. She turns 18 this year.

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
